Course Objectives

This seminar is specifically designed to support students writing their Bachelor Thesis in the field of International Management within the Bachelor's Degree in Business Administration (BWL).

Course Content and Structure

- Research design and research question(s)
- Literature review
- Academic writing
- Plagiarism
- Presentation of selected aspects of the students' thesis work (e.g. research question, status quo of the literature review, planned method) followed by plenary discussions.
- Final presentations of thesis work

The course design is very interactive and combines short inputs by the lecturer with plenary discussions and feedback to the students' thesis work by the lecturer as well as by fellow students. In addition, students should be prepared to share their own thesis-writing experiences with their classmates.

The seminar has a blocked format, teaching language is English. Attendance is expected for the entirety of all course sessions. Students who do not attend 80% of the total class time will automatically receive a negative grade. If students have scheduling conflicts, they must notify the lecturer at least 24 hours in advance. Absences that are not communicated before the start of the session will not be excused. Consequently, any missed graded component in the respective session will result in a negative grade.
